Our state-of-the-art facility in the heart of Fortitude Valley has been designed and developed to promote student safety and training collaboration.


Our building is centred around our students and the learning experience. Spread across the top level, our classrooms are versatile and allow multiple classroom styles to maximise the educational productivity within our courses.

All students are given the opportunity to have complete practical placement at one of our LEAD Childcare centres. Prior to completing placement students will complete an orientation prior to beginning practical placement and will have learnt the skills in the classroom and our skills training room which teaching the handson skills in a simulated childcare centre room.

Students will also attend a welcome session at the childcare centre of their choice prior to beginning their practical placement to get familiar with the setting and meet the Centre Director and be placed with a mentor in the centre. Practical placement is a key component of our training which is why we support our students through a mentor program, clear communication and consistent trainer involvement.

Students can also work with their trainer to identify alternative practical placement opportunities if these locations are not suitable. All students must complete practical placement as a requirement of their course.

Students who choose to study BSB51918 Diploma of Leadership and Management are <u>not</u> required to complete <u>practical</u> placement.

Transportation

Depending on where in Brisbane you stay during your time with us, you will have different travel options to get around Brisbane.

You will need to purchase a Brisbane travel card – go card <u>translink.com.au/tickets-and-fares/go-card</u> to use on busses, trains, ferries, and tram services in greater Brisbane, Ipswich, Sunshine Coast, and Gold Coast regions.

You can buy a go card at some convenience stores, selected retailers, Queensland Rail station ticket offices, fare machines at tram stations, and busway stations, and on Brisbane City Council CityCat and ferries.

Medical Help

If you need to see a doctor while you are in Brisbane, you can make an appointment to see a doctor, also known as a general practitioner (GP), at your local medical centre and not the hospital unless it is an emergency.

You should go to a doctor that can send the bill directly to your OSHC insurance provider. This is called "bulk billing" and means you only have to pay the difference between what is owed to the doctor and what your insurance will cover.

GPs can provide help with minor sickness and offer general medical advice.

In cases of a medical emergency, you should immediately go to the emergency department of your nearest hospital.

It is important that you contact your OSHC insurer before being admitted to a private hospital. While private hospitals will still provide you with medical attention, be aware that not all their services will be covered by OSHC and you may have to pay extra for these services.
